# **ELECTRIFYING MOVEMENT**

The goal of Electrifying Movement is to help advance the electrification of transportation and expand access to rapid public transit in the Greater Toronto and Hamilton Area (GTHA). The transportation sector represents the largest source of greenhouse gas emissions in Ontario. Working with our partners in the sector, we aim to help transition our region from fossil fuel-based transportation choices to clean, electrified modes while also encouraging greater investment in and support for affordable, accessible, and expanded public transit services. These are no doubt challenging propositions. But making progress on either front will result in a range of economic, environmental, and health benefits for our region. Electrifying Movement funding supports network building and convening, research and public policy analysis, communications and outreach work, and pilot programs that seek to build support and advance measures for electrifying movement in the GTHA. We encourage applications from collaboratives that are cross-sector in nature and include non-traditional partners.

# **Eligibility**

Organizations may apply individually or in collaboration with others. Lead applicants must:

- be committed to advancing the electrification of transportation and expanding access to rapid public transit in the GTHA;
- be active within Ontario; and
- have a current, valid charitable registration from the Canada Revenue Agency.

# Deadline

The deadline for 2015 applications is March 25, 2015, 5:00pm.

# **Funding Decision**

Applications will be reviewed by the Foundation's Board and staff, assisted by an advisory panel with knowledge of the sector. Funding decisions will be made at the end of June 2015.
